Grant success, National Resilience Agency seeking community input and Big Scrub Rainforest Day returns ...

Fantastic news! Southern Cross University will fund seven research and community engagement projects to aid ongoing flood recovery in the NSW Northern Rivers.

The Richmond Riverkeeper is excited to be partnering with researchers on a number of these projects, connecting the university and community across the Richmond catchment. Congratulations to the applicants on the following successful projects:

- Associate Professor Adele Wessell: create an online data repository to understand how to manage the Richmond River catchment and restore its health.
- Professor Amanda Reichelt-Brushett: Talking about the Richmond River community values for river health in a post-flood environment.
- Professor Amy Cutter-Mackenzie-Knowles: identify the flood experience of children and youth, and the impact on education.
- Professor Andrew Rose: map the network of community resources contributing to flood recovery and produce a graphic directory of service providers to support recovery and rebuilding efforts.
- Mr Brendan Cox: create and coordinate an ongoing citizen science program to assess riverine ecosystem health across the catchment.

Northern Rivers Resilience Initiative - Community and stakeholder engagement

The National Emergency Management Agency (previously National Recovery and Resilience Agency) has commissioned CSIRO to undertake the Northern Rivers Resilience Initiative to understand the climate, catchment, and hydrological drivers within the Northern Rivers region of New South Wales.

CSIRO with its partner Alluvium Consulting is identifying and prioritising resilience options for mitigating flood risks in the future as part of the first six months rapid review and assessment.
